Being an affiliated college of the Lalit Narayan Mithila University, this College follows the Academic Calendar issued by the University at the beginning of the academic year. 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The assessment of the learning levels of the students is done by the teachers in the classrooms during lectures and through conducting class tests, assignments, tutorials, etc; on the basis of which slow and advanced learners are identified. Specific teaching-learning methodologies oriented to the needs of such students are then discussed and implemented.

An integrated approach is followed in the classes by our faculty. Traditional teaching methods are aided by new age technological methods to make learning more engaging and relatable.

Slow Learners:

Additional tutorials and remedial classes are conducted to give special coaching in areas where they need support.

Additional reading material and books in simple form is made available to increase their understanding of the subject. E-links are also suggested to the students to help them gain an in-depth knowledge of the subject. Bilingual explanations and discussions are done in the class with the aim of reaching out to the slow learners so that they can be brought at par with the rest of the

class.

Personal, academic and career-related counselling is given from time to time. Home assignments are given and evaluated on a regular basis. Additional tests are conducted outside the curriculum to assess the learning ability of students.

Peer learning is encouraged through group discussions and presentations. This aids in building a culture of team work and helps to develop leadership as well as interpersonal skills.

Advanced Learners:

During lectures, tutorials, class tests, assignments and interaction outside the class, the teachers are able to assess the caliber of the students and identify the advanced learners.

Departments through a combination of academic and co-curricular activities encourage the advanced learners to optimize their potential. Such students are encouraged to participate in inter college competitions.

They are suggested advanced readings in the relevant topics to enhance their understanding of the subject to enable them to pursue research in future.

They are encouraged to help and provide support to the weaker students by engaging in group discussions and presentations.

They are given an opportunity for micro teaching in the class as well as making individual presentations.

Teachers of the College try to make the best use of the technology in their teaching process. Teachers have the knowledge and skills to use new digital tools to help all students achieve high academic standards. ICT has enabled better and swifter communication; presentation of ideas in an effective and relevant way. It is

an ineffective tool for acquiring information from multiple sources to help students to enhance their knowledge database.

The College has a Wi-Fi Enabled Campus which helps the teachers and students to stay connected to the internet and learn and teach the updated information. The college has ICT Enabled Classrooms having Desktops, Laptops, Projectors which helps in the e-learning process. Some teachers use and share E-books which are very useful for the students as they are handy and saves the cost of buying the physical books.

The college has an Automated Library which enables the students to find the location of the books easily.

The college has well equipped Computer Labs. Teachers make and present PowerPoint presentations in the classrooms which help them have an interactive conversation with the students. Presentations are the best way to make notes as they can be updated with the latest changes in the knowledge, presenting diagrams, charts, etc.

Teachers have started taking lectures online on Google Meet, Zoom, Microsoft Teams, etc. FDPs are conducted to enable/familiarize the teachers with these online platforms. Teachers share reading materials, short notes, e-books over different media like Google Classroom, E-Mail, WhatsApp, etc.

Teachers most often use ICTs for 'routine tasks' (lesson plan development, information presentation, basic information searches on the Internet, record keeping etc.). Faculty is adapting to the usage of ICT tools to provide quality education to the students.

University guidelines are strictly adhered to with respect to evaluation process. The schedules of internal assessments are communicated to students and faculty in the beginning of the academic year through academic calendar which is prepared based on the university academic calendar. Before a week internal exam time table is displayed on the notice board. Questions are framed, such that they adhere to university standard. The subject handling faculty prepares question bank that covers equal number of questions from each unit, covering all the topics. Departmental internal exam coordinator under the guidance of HOD, checks for the standard of the question bank. Internal exam coordinator ensures smooth conduction of test and proper valuation of internal exam. At the end of each academic year examinations are conducted by the affiliating University.

The Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) is intended to suit the present day needs of the student in terms of securing their path towards higher studies or a terminal degree guiding students towards career choices. 2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

The Institution regularly evaluates the performance of students through various methods for measuring the attainment of each of the Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes.

Evaluation Process: The programme outcomes and Programme Specific outcomes are assessed with the help of course outcomes of the relevant programme through direct evaluation process. It is provided through University Examinations, terminal exams, internal and home assignments, unit tests, surprise tests, open book tests, etc.,.

Throughout the year the faculty records the performance of each student on each programme outcome. At the same time remedial coaching is also provided to slow learners to make pace with the desired progression. Observations of student knowledge and skills against measurable course outcomes are evaluated throughout the year.

The Methods of measuring attainment:

1. Annual Examination: The affiliating University conducts examinations as per annual pattern through which the institution measures programme outcomes based on the course attainment level fixed by the programme. It is a direct evaluation process.

2. Internal and External Assessment: Internal assignments are given to the students which are mostly aligned with Programme Outcomes of the respective subject. External Assessment is evaluated by external experts for the Practical examinations, appointed by the University through Viva-Voce and practical files.

3. Institutional Examination and Tests: Students are assessed and evaluated throughout the year at institutional level through unit test, surprise test, terminal examination and the performance of the student is analyzed for assessing the attainment level of

programmeoutcomes and programme specific outcomes.

4. Feedback Evaluation: The Institution collects feedback from students, Alumni, Employers and Parents which is an important method of measuring attainment with objectives of identifying the attainment level of students in terms of programme, subject, course and syllabus outcomes to understand the impact of teaching learning process.

This provides an insight into one's own assessment of effectiveness of the teaching style and its impact on the students. It highlights how the teacher handles different situations that affect the learning progress of the students. It also makes known the involvement of the teacher in both academic and administrative activities.

The performance appraisal is used for Career Advancement of the teachers who are updated about their performance at each level. If there is a scope for improvement on the part of the teacher, they are advised to upgrade themselves. This is crucial for later promotions as per the norms. The whole system is carried out in a confidential manner. The respective teacher is informed about the same and suggestions given.

Non-Teaching Appraisal

Each employee submits the Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) which is Certified by the respective Reporting Officer of the employee and further certified by Reviewing Officer. Both Reviewing and Reporting Officers accord points to the concerned employee after a careful insight into the self-appraisal report filled. A constructive feedback is given to the employee so that they can further enhance their performance level and efficiency.

Teacher's Evaluation by Students

Students are given the opportunity to provide their feedback of the teachers. As per the procedures outlined by the IQAC, the feedback forms are available online on college website and the Teacher-in-Charge (TIC) ensures that the students of the department fill the feedback questionnaire. The questionnaire is structured to elicit responses for parameters like communication skills, subject knowledge, discipline, workethics, curriculum to provide effective mentoring and career guidance to students and grade the teacher's ability in creating an interactive, discussion-oriented and democratic classroom.

These forms are then evaluated by the Principal of the institution with the help of IQAC who analyses all the reports and meets with teachers with constructive feedback and corrective measures.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Internal Audit:

Internal audit is a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction, whereby the college itself carries out the initial stage of the internal audit. In the initial stage, the officer in-charge scrutinizes and verifies the financial data. This is again scrutinized by the Administrative Officer and the Principal for clarity, authenticity, transparency and financial accuracy. Income/Expenditure is closely monitored by the Bursar and the Principal. Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations are called for and prices are compared. The Institution has formed a Purchase Committee for the purpose.

The audit wing of the UGC visits the college periodically and inspects all the files pertaining to the financial matters that the college has availed of and all the receipts and payments in the college. They, in turn, submit the audit report to the college authorities. Corrections are effected on the basis of the audit report and clarifications called by them are submitted as an audit

reply. For the grants received from the UGC, utilization certificates are prepared according to the allowed expenditure under various heads. The Utilisation Grant Certificates are annually submitted to UGC.

The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an auditor is appointed by the College. The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked. The vouchers and proper record with the concerned Department of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified. The Utilisation Grant Certificates are audited by the external auditor. The audit objections/compliance, if any, is handled by the Accounts Department.

The teachers have reported they have advised the student community to deposit their food waste into the bio-bins and waste food management was thus effectively carried out in especially those schools where space is a limiting factor. The plastic and e-wastes that are quite difficult to be managed were collected and distributed to agencies that deal with e-waste management. The skill enhancement course on plastic reuse has enabled the student community to make beautiful products out of worn out plastics thus promoting plastic recycling. Several saplings are planted at regular intervals by students and staff in 'tree plantation programmes organized by the college and these plants are taken care by gardener. The college campus has been declared as 'Plastic free Zone' so use of plastic bag is avoided and usage of jute bags and cotton bags are motivated. Water conservation is done through rain water harvesting.

Best Practice : MENTORING FOR HOLISTIC GROWTH

Title of the Practice: Mentoring for Holistic Growth

Goal for the Practice: With an unwavering belief that education is a comprehensive experience, our College ensures that the students are equipped both academically and socially. The programme was introduced and undertaken with the noble motive of creating positive citizens of tomorrow. The practice leads to: a. Furnish students with positive thinking-psychological changes. b. Develop selfhood by

understanding the world around them-personality changes. c. Raise a sense of awareness by exploring and discussing contemporary issues-cognitive level changes. d. Learn to look at the society from different vantage points attitudinal changes e. Bring about new modes of action- action level changes.

The Context:

Students and teenagers are subjected to immense pressure owing to the ever-changing value systems in familial and societal factions surrounding them which has resulted in numerous psycho-social issues. In addition, a wide-ranging disparity among students in terms of financial and social status obstructs their holistic development. The conventional classroom setting dissuades the students from opening up their minds. The significance of mutuality and interdependence with fellow beings is not imbibed by the students as part of the present curriculum. Thus, there is discord in the congenial academic domain as students who face such challenges are often found to exhibit disinterest to listening and completing their academic responsibilities. Students were unable to mingle with fellow students from varying socio-economic backgrounds brought about poor group dynamics in classroom settings which has ultimately affected the extra-curricular prospects. Increasing absenteeism and expression of a rebellious and hostile character towards disciplining were also the related challenges. It was in this context that 'mentoring for holistic growth' was introduced.

The Practice: A group of students from a department, ranging from ten to fifteen in number are put together under the guidance of a teacher who acts as the mentor. The group is composed of students from all parts in the department. The mentor gets to know each student personally and extend them support based on their needs. The increased rapport with the students encourages them to share their issues with the mentor. The needs and problems of the student, be it curricular, extra-curricular, personal, psychological or social are identified and dealt with. The students who require specific psycho-social support are referred to the consultant professional counsellor in the college. Each department is given the freedom to implement the practice under the broad guidelines specified by the College and the results are very encouraging. Based on suggestions from the student feedback, modifications in the practice are incorporated from time to time.

Evidence of Success: The practice of mentoring has proven to be of great success. The students have started opening up their needs to the teachers, thereby fostering an improved teacher-student

relationship. As a result, teachers are able to understand the problems faced by the students and help them to resolve the same. The mentor on identification of the specific psycho-social needs of the student leads them to the professional counselling and many students are benefitted from the presence of the professional counsellor on campus.

Problems encountered: In spite of the success of the practice of mentoring, there are certain problems that the system encounters. • The external duties of the teachers such as examination, valuation, training etc., reduce the effectiveness of group wise meeting. In such cases, the group are combined making it unhandy with less scope of individual attention.

Resources Required: The major resource required for the implementation of the programme is availability of manpower.

Best Practice 2
